**The Pétrimoulx Family of Ontario and Michigan:
from Poitrimou/Poitrimoult/Poitrimoul/Poitrimol to Pétrimoulx**

Isabelle Beaussy, in her master's thesis, has stated: "Le nom Pétrimoulx n'est pas un nom de la région vendéenne. Seule la famille de l'émigrant [Michel Pétrimoulx] porte ce nom, que ce soit à Fontenay ou aux alentours."¹ [The Pétrimoulx name is not a name from the Vendée region. Only the family of the emigrant bears this name, whether it is at Fontenay or elsewhere.] This statement is not completely accurate. The Pétrimoulx family name did not originate in the Department of the Vendée nor was Michel Petrimoulx's family the first to use this surname. The Petrimoulx name can be found in the parish registers of Étampes in the Department of Essonne. However, it did not originate there, either. It appears to have come originally from the present-day department of Eure-et-Loir.

The first record which pertained to **Michel Pétrimoulx** in the New World was at Port Toulouse, Isle Royale, 26 July 1716. This record was a certificate for Pierre Morpain, captain of Port Toulouse [present-day St. Peter's, Nova Scotia], charged with probing accurately the entrance and the *Havre* [harbor] in order to discover a channel for the King's vessels to enter the port. This was signed by La Ronde Denys, De Laforest, Petrimoulx, Charles Boudrot and François Coste.² Michel Pétrimoulx's name next appeared in the register of Notre-Dame de Québec on 14 October 1717 [below] when he was godfather to Charles Michel de la nation des panis [from the Pawnee nation],³ aged seven to eight years.⁴



Several years later, when **Michel Pétrimoulx** married **Marie-Louise Mailloux**, daughter of the architect **Jean Mailloux** and **Marguerite Caron**, 10 July 1726, at Notre-Dame de Québec, he was said to be the son of **Pierre Pétrimoulx** and **Marie-Anne Caillard** from the parish of Notre-Dame at Fontenay-le-Comte, which is now in the Department of the Vendée in the old province of Poitou.⁵

In actually searching the register of Notre-Dame, Fontenay-le-Comte, it soon became apparent that several key records were missing: the marriage of Michel's parents and Michel's own baptism. I began to do a "google" search in the remote hope that I could find any record relating to the family. After many combinations of names, dates, places, I discovered the site with the well-researched and documented information found by Isabelle Beaussy. In her research, there was the date for a marriage contract of **Pierre Petrimoulx** and **Marie Anne Cailleau**: 28 October 1685, and the name of the notary.⁶ At that time I was not aware of all the records (parish registers, notarial records,

cadastral maps) that were available from the Vendée archives. I went online, found their e-mail address (archives@vendee.fr), and wrote an e-mail requesting a copy of the marriage contract. After a few e-mails, it soon became apparent that it would be very difficult to obtain a copy. To my surprise, they sent me, via the internet, a copy of the marriage contract of **Pierre Petrimoulx** and **Marieanne Cailleau / Caillaud**, who was the *veuve donnataire* [widow beneficiary] of **Pierre Marolleau**, and the daughter of **Jacques Cailleau** and **Marie Audebert**. In this contract, Pierre Petrimoulx was said to be a native of Étampes and the son of the deceased **Nicolas Petrimoulx**, a *marchand tanneur* [leather merchant], and **Elizabeth Raynard / Renard**.



It should be noted that the notary wrote the name as "Peitrimoulx/Peitrimoul."

On the second page of the contract was the information that Pierre's grandparents were **Colee [sic] Petrimoulx** and ...**guerite B....n** [the remaining letters had deteriorated due to age or maybe even the chewing of a mouse in the archives].⁷



Because Michel's father Pierre was said to be a native of Étampes, I now knew there was a good reason why I had never found any early Pétrimoulx records in the parish registers at Fontenay-le-Comte.⁸ The next step was to check the extant parish registers for Étampes. There are several churches in Étampes: **St. Basile**, with baptismal registers beginning in 1563; **Notre-Dame d'Étampes**, with baptismal registers beginning in 1545; **St. Gilles d'Étampes**, with registers beginning in 1697 [earlier registers seem to have disappeared]; **St. Pierre d'Étampes**, with registers beginning in 1697; **St. Martin d'Étampes**, with registers beginning in 1703.

Only two of the parishes could be searched for records in the correct time period, assuming that Pierre Pétrimoulx was born and baptized there between 1650 and 1665 [allowing for him to be between the ages of 20 and 35 when he

married in 1685]. I did not find any mention of Pierre or his parents, Nicolas Pétrimoulx and Elizabeth Raynard. However, the family of **Jacques Pétrimoulx and Marie Caillou** was found in the parish registers of St. Basile d'Étampes. This was the first time that I had found another Pétrimoulx family in France. The records, that I was able to find for this family, dated from 20 May 1655, at Notre-Dame d'Étampes when Marie Caillou, wife of Jacques Pétrimoulx, served as a godmother, to 23 February 1677 at St. Basile d'Étampes, the date of the marriage of Jacques Pétrimoulx, widower of Marie Caillou, to **Louise Venard**.⁹ Jacques Pétrimoulx and Marie Caillou were the parents of at least two children: Jacques and Marie. At the time of his second marriage in 1677, both Jacques and his son, Jacques, signed the register. The Pétrimoulx signatures, found to date, are unmistakable: Michel Pétrimoulx, 1717, Québec; Jacques Pétrimoulx, 1677, Étampes; and Pierre Pétrimoulx, 1685, Fontenay-le-Comte.


Because I was not able to find any records relating to Pierre Pétrimoulx and his parents, I knew the search was not over. I went to www.geneanet.org, a site for which I pay, and put in the name of Petrimoulx and the commune of Etampes. That brought up two genealogical trees, which turned out to be the same tree. On that tree **Guillaume Rannou**¹⁰ had the names of Jacques Pétrimoulx married to Marie Caillou and a second marriage to Louise Venard. In addition, Guillaume Rannou had the marriage of Jacques' daughter, Marie, and the names of Jacques' parents: **Cesse Petrimoulx and Marguerite Bourdin**. The name Bourdin made sense because, in the marriage contract [p. 50], I was able to make out the letter "B" for her last name and the final letter of "n," with not too many letters in between. Since I now had the name of Pierre's mother, and it seemed Pierre Petrimoulx also had an uncle who had been at Étampes, I decided to try another means of searching on Geneanet. I put in an individual search, using the name of Marguerite Bourdin. I discovered there were a lot of Marguerite Bourdins. The only distinguishing feature for "my" Marguerite Bourdin was that she was married to a Petrimoulx. The next feature on Geneanet that I employed was the insertion of the spouse's name. That produced only one result: the one I already had. I then went back and again put in Marguerite Bourdin, but this time I limited the searching to between the years 1600 and 1654, the year that had been mentioned by Guillaume Rannou as the burial year for Marguerite. Several pages of possibilities were found. Only one made sense: Marguerite Bourdin married to **Samson Poitrimou**, from the town of Toury in the modern department of Eure-et-Loire.¹¹


The parish registers for Touy can be accessed online or through the Family History Library.¹² In my online search I found a **Louys Poitrimou** and **Marguerite Bourdin** serving as godparents in 1623. Then, an important discovery was made: the baptism of **Nicolas Poitrimoux**, son of **Sisse [sic] Poitrimoux** and **Marguerite Bourdin**.¹³



Transcription: Le lundy vingt sixeme jour de septembre 1624 fut baptisé Nicollas fils de Sixe / Sisse [sic] Poitrimou et de Marg^{te} Bourdin ses parrains estaiant M^{rc} Nicollas Dutartre n^{rc} royal et Louis Poitrimou et la marraine Anthoinette Badin femme de Simon

Translation: Monday, the 26th day of September 1624, was baptized Nicollas, son of Sixe / Sisse (?) Poitrimou and Marguerite Bourdin. His godfathers were M^{rc} Nicollas Dutartre, royal notary, and Louis Poitrimou, and the godmother was Anthoinette Badin, wife of Simon

Nicolas appears to be the first child born to this couple. His siblings were: **Pierre Poitrimol**, baptized December 1626; **Jeanne Poitrimoult**, baptized 27 October 1629 [her godfather was a **Pierre Poitrimoult** who signed as Pierre Pitrimoulx (*sic*)];



Anne Poitrimoult, baptized 11 May 1632; **Jacques Poitrimoux**, baptized 21 August 1634.¹⁴ In all of these baptismal records the father's first name, as well as the family name, continually changes: Cesse, Sixe or Sisse, Cesson/Sesson.

The last time that I was able to find any mention of Nicolas Poitrimou/Petrimoul(x) at Touy was 10 August 1643 [below] when he served as godfather to his cousin, **Nicolas Guenée**, son of **François Guenée** and **Marie Petrimoul**. In this act Nicolas was said to be from the parish of St. Gilles d'Étampes, and he signed




François Guenée and Marie Poitrimou were married at Toury *circa* 22 Octobre 1623, the date of their marriage contract. In this contract Marie was said to be the daughter of the deceased **Pierre Poitrimou** and **Marie Maslon** and the sister of Louis, Marin and Sixe/Sisse Poitrimou.¹⁵

It appears that the Poitrimou family moved from Toury to Étampes after the baptism of Jacques in 1634. By 1685 Pierre Pétrimoult, son of Nicolas, was living at Fontenay-le-Comte, far from Toury, as can be seen on the map below.



Based on some of the other Poitrimou families on Jean Pierre Martin's site, the Department of Eure-et-Loir seems to be where the records of the Poitrimou/Pétrimoult family of Ontario and Michigan are first found, at least by the end of the 1500s. Some of the other towns he mentions are Bazoches-les-Hauts, Viabon, Tiley-le-Péneux, and Germignonville, all of which are to the west and southwest of Toury. [See the map on the next page.] The online records and films from the Family History Center start about 1672. There might be connections between the families shown on Jean Pierre Martin's site and the family of Pierre Poitrimou and Marie Maslon, but, because of the scarcity of records, a connection cannot be made at this time.
